The purpose of the Voluntary Product Accessibility Template, or VPAT, is to assist Federal contracting officials and other buyers in making preliminary assessments regarding the availability of commercial "Electronic and Information Technology" products and services with features that support accessibility. (a) When software is designed to run on a system that has a keyboard, product functions shall be executable from a keyboard where the function itself or the result of performing a function can be discerned textually.	Supported with exceptions	The Snap Deploy Management Console supports limited keyboard navigation via [Tab] key but lacks full functionality without use of mouse. Bootable media supports the use of navigation via the [Tab] key and menu operations via the [Alt] key and indicated character.
(b) Applications shall not disrupt or disable activated features of other products that are identified as accessibility features, where those features are developed and documented according to industry standards. Applications also shall not disrupt or disable activated features of any operating system that are identified as accessibility features where the application programming interface for those accessibility features has been documented by the manufacturer of the operating system and is available to the product developer.	Supported	Acronis products do not interfere with neither Microsoft Windows operating systems' accessibility features nor the accessibility features of other applications.
(c) A well-defined on-screen indication of the current focus shall be provided that moves among interactive interface elements as the input focus changes. The focus shall be programmatically exposed so that Assistive Technology can track focus and focus changes.	Supported	Acronis products highlight or alter the element as a user moves between them in the interface. The method of indication varies but still indicative of the user's choice.

Not Supported	Acronis Snap Deploy does not appear to include descriptors as part of the user interface elements. While some items may have descriptive names, no items appear to include tooltips or other such identifiers.
(e) When bitmap images are used to identify controls, status indicators, or other programmatic elements, the meaning assigned to those images shall be consistent throughout an application's performance.	Supported	Images used throughout Acronis Snap Deploy appear clear and consistent in their meaning and action.
(f) Textual information shall be provided through operating system functions for displaying text. The minimum information that shall be made available is text content, text input caret location, and text attributes.	Not Supported	Acronis Snap Deploy does not present textual information in a format that Narrator recognizes, currently it will only pick up the fact that the Snap Deploy Management Console window is active however will not read any user interface elements selected within the window.
(g) Applications shall not override user selected contrast and color selections and other individual display attributes.	Supported	Acronis Snap Deploy Management Console does not accept visual settings from the Operating System for visual impairment configurations such as high contrast.
(h) When animation is displayed, the information shall be displayable in at least one non-animated presentation mode at the option of the user.	Not applicable	
(i) Color coding shall not be used as the only means of conveying information, indicating an action, prompting a response, or distinguishing a visual element.	Supported with exceptions	Acronis Snap Deploy utilizes multiple methods to convey information such as interacting with an element. While some elements utilize solely color coding (highlighting), other elements utilize different visual indicators such as circling the specified element.
(j) When a product permits a user to adjust color and contrast settings, a variety of color selections capable of producing a range of contrast levels shall be provided.	Not applicable	Acronis Snap Deploy does not allow for customization of the visual layout, representation, or display of the user interface.
(k) Software shall not use flashing or blinking text, objects, or other elements having a flash or blink	Supported	Acronis Snap Deploy does not utilize flashing or blinking elements.

Not Supported	Acronis Snap Deploy does not appear to support assistive technology such as Screen Narrator as it does not present information in a manner that can be read by this or similar visual impairment tools. Boot media is run prior to booting into the OS, and therefor does not have assistive technology available.
